I found a number of interesting motifs woven throughout Renee Watson's book, "Piecing Me Together," including Spanish words, collage, and the human tendency to stereotype those who are different from us. One theme that especially appealed to me was food: as an indicator of economic health, and as a symbol of camaraderie and affection. The refrigerator played a significant role in the story as a message center and device showing just how difficult it can sometimes be for a single mother to keep food on the table. The author used the word "fridge" 27 times in this book. So I chose the lowly appliance for the subject of my painting, using my own refrigerator as a model.
