





She has given readings and lectures at many renown places including the United Nations, the Library of Congress, and the U.S. Embassy in Japan. Her poetry and fiction often centers around the lived experiences of black girls and women, and explores themes of home, identity, and the intersections of race, class, and gender. Renée grew up in Portland, Oregon and currently lives in New York City.
