

If people in western Oregon receive a warning that a major earthquake is imminent—say 10 to 30 seconds away what difference can it make? About the Author

Ozeki's acclaimed, award-winning 2013 novel tells the stories of two lives that entwine across the Pacific Ocean. Ruth is a novelist living on a coastal island in Vancouver, BC and struggling with her mother's illness and writer's block. She becomes wrapped up in the story of 16-year-old Nao Yasutani of Tokyo after discovering the girl's diary in a Hello Kitty lunchbox washed ashore following a tsunami in Japan. Ruth becomes absorbed by the drama of Nao's life and her unknown fate.



Salem Reads

Salem Reads is a community reads project that invites everyone in Salem to read the same book, take part in discussions, and enjoy related programs throughout the month of February 2022. The Salem Public Library Foundation sees Salem Reads as an opportunity to increase the Library's visibility, and act as a catalyst to bring the community together for discussions relevant to our time. Our selection of *A Tale for the Time Being*, allows broad community engagement as we offer programs on topics of importance to our city.

Salem Reads chosen title, A Tale for the Time Being, will be given away Wednesday December 8 (details on page 2) 300 books will be distributed in a grab and go style pick up at the Main Library.
