

The Foundation is grateful to the community for passing the Salem Public Library seismic safety bond measure (November 2017). Over the last year, the forty-nine year old main library building has received a seismic retrofit, modifications for ADA compliance, and other necessary safety and infrastructure improvements.

Construction has remained on schedule despite the September fires with rain and February ice storms. We are grateful to all the partners on the project; City of Salem project managers, Hacker Architects, and contractor, Howard S. Wright. The improvements include new shear walls to fortify the building, roof replacement, energy saving windows and lighting, as well as parking garage safety upgrades and a new entrance. We hope to open to some public access in the summer/fall of 2021.

To further enhance the library's use and accessibility, the Library Foundation was proud to support five highly desirable projects not originally funded by the bond measure. They include replacement of west side concrete

It allows patrons to view the beautiful panorama to the West. Now, passersby can see into the Library from the street, revealing Library activity and hopefully creating curiosity for those who don't regularly visit the Library.



The Difference an Estate Gift can make...

Estate gifts have helped fund impactful Library enhancements over the years. Projects like the Teen Scene, Anderson Rooms, portions of the Children's Area. Some gifts have been designated for specific projects, but most are unrestricted; to be used at the discretion of the Foundation board when received. These thoughtful and generous unrestricted gifts allow us to take advantage of opportunities like the seismic retrofit enhancements. The improvements will serve generations of library users in ways that were unimaginable just a couple of years ago.

Please consider the Foundation as you make your estate plans. The language of a bequest is important, but it does not need to be complex. Example: "I hereby give and bequeath______ (a specific gift or a percentage of the residue of my estate) to the Salem Public Library Foundation whose legal address is PO Box 325, Salem Oregon 97308, tax ID 93-0799658, for such purposes as the Salem Public Library Foundation shall determine are in the best interest of Salem Public Library."

You can ask your attorney or accountant about the potential tax benefits for you and your family of including charitable organizations in your will or trust. We hope you will consider including the Foundation in your plans. Your contribution will help all the future generations who access our public library for literacy, learning, and community connection.



What is a Sprinkles Grant?

The Foundation gives Sprinkles Grants to Library staff, so that:

- Staff create engaging, experimental programs
- **Local residents** discover, connect, and explore the Library
- Users acquire knowledge, and are engaged in new ways
- Local residents read broadly and regularly
- Everyone feels connected to their community!

These grants allow every staff member the opportunity to reflect Foundation values as they try untested, unbudgeted ideas. The Board knows such projects risk failure, but time has shown that there is also great potential for success. Either way, there is value in experience.

Sample of Sprinkles Grant Awards

 Staff created a virtual Salem Public Library for the online game, Animal Crossing: New Horizons. Also purchased tabletop roleplaying games like Dungeons and Dragons for in library use.



- Supplies for contact-free materials delivery to elderly homebound through Operation Book Shelf.
- Teen Scene's maker tool cart, and volunteer workstation carts for Youth Services.
- Two-way language translator, the size of a smart phone, to aid patron and library staff communication in 76 languages.
- Freestanding offsite outreach kiosk enables patrons to browse and borrow eBooks, get a temporary Library card, and more.
- Digital divide efforts, five tablet computers for patron check out, computer literacy software for library use. Youth Services devises to help parents guide children as they learn to read.
- Library card lanyards for all kids when they get their first library card.

In Memory of Two Dear Friends

In December of 2020, Salem lost one of our best friends, Selma Pierce. Her passing shocked the community, and in their grief, many gave generous gifts to the Library Foundation. We are grateful for everyone's kindness in her memory. We asked Bud, her husband, about her connection to Libraries, this is what he said.

"Oregonians who knew **Selma Pierce** saw her as a strong, competent woman, a dentist, a community servant, a wife and mother, who would enter the realm of politics near the end of her life. But Selma wasn't always this way. She grew up in the Richmond District of San Francisco in an ethnic Chinese Community, a very shy and reserved child. Selma spent a great deal of her childhood and early teenage years in the Richmond Branch of the San Francisco Public Library, where she was a voracious reader. Selma would learn about history, culture, and distant lands. She developed great knowledge and curiosity about travel in her childhood readings. There was nothing more important than the public library in Selma's childhood."

In March we lost another dear friend of the Library, **Jan Alsever**. "Jan loved the Library for so many different reasons and was honored to be able to donate to a cause that was so close to her heart. We are excited that her next gift will be used in many wonderful ways when opportunities arise." wrote Jan's daughter.

Jan's children have very fond memories of their frequent visits to the Salem Public Library. Her daughter remembered riding the bus to the Library, "I was so proud to be going "all by myself" to pick out my books for the next week and returning the ones that I had finished. With my library card in hand, I would always wander around while checking out all the options but eventually ending up with Nancy Drew, the Hardy Boys, Little House on the Prairie, and any others that had horses in it. I am positive that's where my love of reading started and bloomed. What a gift!"
